

#### **Four Way Junction at Stamford**

The four way junction at Stamford has always been a concern, due to indecision by drivers, especially in the Summer months when tourists are not familiar with who takes priority on the road.

Work to ensure the crossing is made safer for everyone will commence at the end of February 2023.

#### Electric buses & EV chargers coming to region

The council has welcomed news that a fleet of new electric buses are coming to the region. The vehicles are on the way alongside 92 more charging points, after the North East successfully secured £19.5m of investment in a Transport Decarbonisation package.

The investment will deliver up to 52 new high-quality electric buses which will travel on some of the region's most heavily congested routes, alongside the new Electric Vehicle (EV) chargers – many at key destinations such as Park and Ride sites – to encourage multimodal journeys.

It is hoped expanded EV charging infrastructure will encourage more people to consider switching to a zero-emission vehicle where possible.

This funding will boost the availability of zero carbon transport options for local people, enabling cleaner, greener journeys to work & education, improving air quality, and reducing our carbon emissions from transport. The aim is to work towards Net Zero bus fleets by 2035.

#### **New Northumberland Stop Smoking Website Launches**

A new website has been launched to help Northumberland's smokers quit. Supporting people to stop smoking is a priority for Northumberland County Council - <a href="www.stopsmokingnorthumberland.co.uk">www.stopsmokingnorthumberland.co.uk</a> unlocks help and advice for people on their journey to quitting.

More than 80% of people in Northumberland are non-smokers, yet smoking is still the main cause of preventable illness and death in the county. The new website will allow people to access lots of help, information and encouragement to stop smoking for good from the Northumberland Stop Smoking Service - a friendly, experienced team of advisers and specialists. With expert help from the stop smoking service, people are three times more likely to succeed than those who try to quit without support.

Wendy Pattison, Cabinet Member for Adult Wellbeing at Northumberland County Council, said: "Smoking is a leading cause of health inequalities and is responsible for much of the difference in life expectancy between the rich and poor. "

"We want to give our residents all the support we possibly can in their journey to stopping smoking. We know not everyone can access websites easily, so we also want to remind our residents that help and advice from the Northumberland Stop Smoking Service is available by calling 01670 813135.

Winter might seem like a quiet time of year, but there's still lots happening in the quarry.



Stabilisation of Quarry House is complete and work will soon begin on a new accessible footpath and groundworks to remove part of the nearby building spoil.

It's wonderful to see the old floor of the stables, and hard to imagine that the house was still habitable by people 40 years ago!

These days, it's home to a regionally important colony of tree sparrows. An interpretation board will provide information on the history and wildlife.

The Exmoor ponies are doing a great job of grazing. Yes, the ground is churned up and muddy in places, but this creates wonderful seedbeds for wildflowers to flourish later in the year.

It also prevents rank vegetation overwhelming all those lovely orchids and the nectar plants that are all-important for insects. We've now reached the milestone of 800 different species of plants and animals in our database and are looking forward to more sightings this year.



## **Space for Shorebirds**





It's a time of change on the Northumberland Coast, as signs of spring are in the air! Spring migration is an exciting time of year, as birds all over the world are

on the move. Species we have been watching, such as turnstone (photo above), sanderling and dunlin are preparing for a mighty journey to their breeding grounds in Arctic Canada, Svalbard & N. Scandinavia.

Before they embark on their migration, the birds must feed as much as they can to ensure they are fit and healthy, giving them the best chance possible of surviving their long journey and the breeding season. As part of their preparations, their physiology changes; their heart and lungs increase in size, and other internal organs not essential for a longdistance flight shrink, turning them into mini athletes without having to do any training!

It's incredibly important that we give the shorebirds plenty of space so they aren't disturbed whilst feeding or roosting. Every calorie counts for them, and energy wasted by flying away from unnecessary danger could be the difference between making it to their breeding grounds or not.

We are calling on our incredible Dog Rangers to help keep shorebirds safe as they prepare for the most challenging months of their lives. The Dog Ranger team is made up of nature-loving dogs & their owners, who have promised to give the birds space and never chase them. We have almost 100 dogs on the team now & we're so grateful to them for spreading the word and setting a fantastic example when walking on the beach.



As we say goodbye to the shorebirds heading North, we are planning our shorebird nest protection programme for ringed plovers and oystercatchers which nest along the Northumberland coast. The nest site on Embleton Beach has successfully supported birds of both species for 2 successive years now, and

from early assessments of the habitat, it looks suitable for the birds again this year. In addition to this site, ringed plovers successfully raised chicks at Low Newton last year, showing just how important this stretch of coastline is for them.

Their success wouldn't have been possible without support from local residents. It was a pleasure to talk to so many of you about the birds' progress throughout the season. Over the past two years we have recruited a large proportion of our Dog Ranger team at nest sites in this area, and we are extremely grateful to them for always giving the sites space to avoid disturbing the birds.

Over the coming months, along with the fantastic ringed plover surveyors from Coast Care, we will be out along the whole of the Northumberland Coast looking for potential nest sites and protecting as many as we can in a bid to build on the success of previous seasons and give ringed plovers a fighting chance of conserving their vulnerable population.

We are always looking for dogs to join our team, so if you have a pup who would make the perfect Dog Ranger then we'd love to hear from you! ## **Farming News**

## Lucia Bridgeman

Many farms have added to their business by diversifying into areas other than food production. We have been running Brunton House and Cottages for 10 years, offering self-catering accommodation in several different sized properties.

We got permission 12 years ago to convert our dilapidated, old, stone farm buildings into holiday cottages. We finished the first phase in 2012 and are now working on the second phase. We are very lucky to have great skilled local tradesmen who we have built relationships with over the years.

The farm buildings were no longer suitable for any modern farming role. The Brunton granary and mill are hundreds of years old and from archives we know that in late C13th the canons of Alnwick Abbey were granted the right to grind their corn at the Brunton Mill. The old mill building still had a water wheel working in 1930s, and evidence of the old sluice gates can still be seen now, but the position and size of these historic buildings made them tricky to incorporate into the farm. My father-in-law turned part of the old granary into a grain drying facility and storage in 1953. By the late 70s this was too small and too slow to keep up with the volume of crops and the speed with which they were then being harvested by the modern combines.

Having sat unused for forty years, the granary is now being converted as part of the Brunton tourism business. We are turning what was becoming a liability into an asset and it is very satisfying seeing these old buildings being brought back into life and adding another chapter. Converting old buildings is far more complicated and costly than creating new builds, but we unearth history and learn from the stonemasons, joiners and drainage team about things they have uncovered. Huge horseshoes from the old cart horses, branding irons, and the remains of the old oak water wheel are amongst the finds.



The Fourth Sunday of Lent is also known as 'Refreshment Sunday' or the 'Sunday of the five loaves', as it was supposedly the day on which the miracle of Jesus feeding the five thousand took place.



This is a rare day of relief from the austerity of Lent and historically workers were given the day off to join their families and attend a church service in the nearest important church or cathedral - their 'Mother' church. As time went by, servants and apprentices in particular would use this special time to visit their families and spend precious time with their mothers, hence the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent becoming Mothering Sunday.

More recently, Mother's Day has become a celebration of the role of the mother & is now the 3rd most popular time to buy greeting cards, behind only Christmas & Valentine's Day.

## Clocks Go Forward, 26th March

Don't forget Daylight Savings Time will begin at 1am on Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> March, when the clocks will "spring" forward by one hour.

Did you know...Daylight Savings was introduced in 1916 to conserve coal & give farmers an
